President's Message

Dear CivFed members,

With everything that's going on across the river in Washington, and its actual and potential impact on us in Arlington, it seemed like a good time to offer to our members an in-depth panel on public safety issues.

Our panel discussion will headline our April 8 Civ Fed general membership meeting at our usual time and place -- 7:00 p.m. in the Hazel Auditorium of the Virginia Hospital Center.

The panel will include a representative of the Arlington County Commonwealth's Attorney, the County Police Chief, the Sheriff, and a representative from the Department of Human Services. We will discuss various topics related to the responsibilities of each office in addressing crime and mental health, as well as how these offices, agencies, and law enforcement work together.

There will be plenty of time for questions from members. You'll find more details below.

On another current issue, and in accordance with our bylaws, Civ Fed's environmental affairs committee has prepared an emergency resolution opposing the recent declaration of intent by Dominion Virginia Power to clear-cut trees and bushes along the Old Dominion bike trail. Given the urgency of this issue, we will present this resolution to the membership for a vote. Please see the article below for a full text of this important resolution.

I also want to share with you a matter of concern to all of us in Arlington, and some steps Civ Fed is taking to address it. The horrific plane-helicopter crash on January 29 over the Potomac River near National Airport that claimed 67 lives has highlighted issues of safety and congestion as well as noise and the economic impact of our Arlington airport.

Several members have been working on a resolution to address these key, interrelated issues, and I'd like to extend an invitation to our membership to join this effort. Please let me know via email if you are interested in being part of it. We'll be continuing our work in the coming weeks, and it is not too late for you to join.

Your Executive Board is working on a number of other initiatives; we're looking

forward to sharing with you as they develop. Meantime, as always, please do consider an even more active role for yourselves as our committees expand their work. Your ideas are ultimately what fuels our activity. Please keep them coming.

March General Membership Meeting Outbrief

ACCF was honored to welcome Arlington County government and civic leadership to discuss a range of topics including updates from the Arlington County School Board and Chief of Police Andy Penn. We also welcomed Daughters of the American Revolution - Arlington Chapter House back into ACCF membership, and aligned on representatives for the ACCF Nominating and Awards Committees. We included time for the audience to ask questions throughout, with membership involvement in the discussion a priority. Discussion highlights included:

 Several members of the Arlington County School Board (Chair Mary Kadera, Vice Chair Bethany Zecher Sutton, and Kathleen Clark) and Arlington Public School Superintendent Dr. Francisco Durán discussed the FY26 budget, revenue streams, and expenses. They shared a timeline for APS budget next steps, to include a budget presentation on March 13th. Dr. Duron expects a deficit of \$42mm. We also discussed priorities including employee compensation and cost of living adjustment (COLA), planning factors for staffing programs, school safety, inflationary costs, and enrollment increases. - 2. **Arlington Chief of Police** Andy Penn discussed a slight increase in crime this year, prioritizing staff and budget for APD core services, and APD's engagement and collaboration with federal authorities regarding immigration.
- 3. A motion was made to welcome a returning member, **Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Arlington Chapter House**, back into ACCF. The motion was moved, seconded, and approved by acclamation.

Resolution on Dominion Energy tree cutting along rights-of-way in W&OD Park. Sponsored by the ACCF Environmental Affairs Committee Introduced to the Membership at the April 8, 2025 Meeting for Emergency Vote Mary Glass, Chair and Point of Contact <u>environmental.affairs.chair@civfed.org</u>

Whereas the ACCF supports the Requested Actions in the Northern Virginia Parks Authority's 3/12/25 letter to Amanda Keyes, Dominion Capital Projects, attached to this resolution[1];

Whereas the ACCF adopted the "RESOLUTION ON CLIMATE ADAPTATION" [2] at its 12 November 2024 meeting requesting actions from Arlington County including:

"5. That A[rlington] C[ounty] parks plans and site plans should be required to preserve existing mature canopy as well as increasing ecosystem-enhancing canopy trees and ground level vegetation, planted in soil and maintained for long-term survival of the plantings..."

7. That Arlington County proceeds to develop a comprehensive, climate-facing green infrastructure strategy that includes natural sites as well as necessary use of green infrastructure integration with built infrastructure..."

Whereas the Arlington County Urban Tree Canopy Assessment September 2024[3] noted the importance of retaining existing tree canopy:

"Over the study periods, public land has shown a 4% increase, private land has increased by 3.7% and right-of-way areas grew by 3.2%. The largest contributor to tree canopy growth is the shift of grass and other vegetation to tree canopy. Notably, parks across Arlington County saw a 6% rise in tree canopy, growing from 59% to 65%, partly driven by the expansion of existing trees, including recent plantings."

Whereas the Arlington County Board adopted a resolution <u>"Protecting the Natural Environment along the W&OD Trail"</u> on March 18, 2025[4] with requests to Dominion that included:

- End plans to cut most trees
- Selectively prune only those trees that pose a direct threat to power lines,
- A vegetative height limit allowing for more native species of trees, and
 Where trees are removed, replacement planting of diverse species be
- conducted and maintained including control of invasive species.

Whereas the Arlington County Board has expressed consistent opposition to the Dominion transmission lines within the W&OD right-of-way due to the deleterious effects on the recreational use of the corridor and the extensive loss of trees associated with it, and confirmed this in a resolution passed July 10, 2004[5];

Whereas the April 2024 Metropolitan Council of Governments' report "CONSERVING TREES AND FORESTS IN METROPOLITAN WASHINGTON[6]" stated that:

"...trees and forests should be regarded as an indispensable component of public infrastructure. These natural resources provide a wide range of services to COG member jurisdictions."

Therefore, be it resolved that the Arlington County Civic Federation takes the following positions and recommends and requests actions by Arlington County (AC).

- 1. That Arlington County engage in discussions with NOVA Parks and Dominion and other key stakeholders, including ACCF, to explore alternatives to the current plans for trimming and removing trees from the W&OD Park in light the AC Board's recent resolution on climate change and the AC General Plan,
- 2. That Arlington County explore less destructive alternatives to control vegetation that is potentially a genuine risk, including new technologies such as <u>LiDAR</u> and others that can give real time information using existing GIS and monitoring systems on transmission ROW's.
- 3. That Arlington County review the history of transmission ROW vegetation clearing locally and in other jurisdictions, and how applicable state and federal regulations are interpreted.

Neighborhood Mini Grant Program Renewed By Nicholas Giacobbe, ACCF VP


Thanks to County Board <u>approval</u> on March 15, the Neighborhood Services Division will offer the <u>Neighborhood Mini Grant</u> (NMG) program again this year. Increasing to \$20,000 from last year's \$10,000, the NMG is a competitive grant program to

support projects that build community and engage residents.

The program's goals are to provide Arlington neighborhoods and community-based organizations with funding opportunities to encourage civic and community building through a variety of activities, programs, events, and projects that promote racial equity, diversity, and inclusion. For successful ideas from last year's program, see this <u>list</u> of approved projects.

The maximum grant amount will be 1,000 per applicant and to be eligible applicants need to be 501(c)(3) organizations, civic associations, and community groups with tax identification numbers located in Arlington County. CivFed will once again be available to help partner members with organizations with 501(c)(3)status who can serve as fiscal sponsors.

The application period will open in April and close at the end of June. Grants will be awarded by August 1 for a period of performance from August through June 30, 2026. Be on the lookout for more details and application materials in an Arlington County press release and newsletters.

Virginia Hospital Center Hazel Auditorium Parking and Access Instructions for General Membership Meetings

Reminder: Parking passes will be provided. Meetings are held in the 'Conference Center' depicted on the map below.


The VHC Director of Security has advised CivFed that we should begin to park in Parking Garage C (map below). You can then walk across to the Oncology entrance and gain admittance until 8 p.m. **After the meeting, you MUST EXIT via the Women's and Infant lobby.**

ENTER (until 8 p.m.): Zone C Ground floor Oncology entrance (only open until 8 pm, Monday-Friday)

- Sign into the visitor kiosks (need driver's license each time)
- Get visitor sticker and wear at all times when inside the hospital
- Take a right at the double doors by the visitor kiosks
- Take a right at the single door
- Go to elevators and take to lobby floor
- Exit elevators and go left to hall directly behind welcome desk in lobby
- Take a left at the single door and continue down the hall toward a set of double doors
- Go through double doors and go right
- Conference center auditorium is directly ahead

ENTER or EXIT (24/7): Zone C first floor Women's and Infant lobby entrance (please use this entrance to exit after 8 pm, open 24/7):

- Sign into the visitor kiosks (need driver's license each time)
- Get visitor sticker and wear at all times when inside the hospital
- Walk to hall directly behind the welcome desk in the lobby
- Take a left at the single door and continue down the hall toward a set of double doors
- Go through double doors and go right
- Conference center auditorium is directly ahead
